Presently, a portion of the site carries the zoning designation of General Commercial (CG) and may be used for commercial purposes. A larger portion of the site is zoned Medium Density Multiple-Family Residential (RM-10). Should the City adopt the proposed comprehensive plan land use map amendment to designate the entire parcels as auto-oriented commercial and grant approval of the subsequent rezone application to CG, there will be an opportunity to develop the entire site with a commercial use. Future proposed projects may result in increases to discharge to water; emissions to air; production, storage, or release of toxic or hazardous substances; or production of noise; which would be evaluated in conjunction with future permit/environmental review applications.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce such increases are:

In addition to the state environmental policy act (SEPA) and other applicable regulations, such as the Washington State Clean Air Act, the City of Puyallup Critical Areas Ordinance is the implementing code that must be met by all future development. Future proposed projects will be individually reviewed for site-specific impacts.

2. How would the proposal be likely to affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life?

As a non-project action, the proposal will not affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life. Future proposed projects will be individually reviewed for site-specific impacts.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve plants, animals, fish, or marine life are:

All site-specific projects are required to comply with all local, state, and federal laws regarding the protection of habitat, including endangered species.

 How would the proposal be likely to deplete energy or natural resources? As a non-project action, the proposal will not deplete energy or natural resources. Future proposed projects may result in increases to energy and natural resource use.
